This translation may give a clearer picture of local quarantine/lockdown specifications that eventually leads to a better comprehension of the said regulations." Asiones in "On Second Wind: Understanding How Academics from the Philippines Adjust to Retirement", he explores how "retired academics experienced work-to-retirement transitions and offer insights that can be applied in addressing it potential opportunities and challenges."
